Re-Elected Council Members and Mayor Sworn in at January Reorganization Meeting

Janice S. Mironov was sworn in as Mayor by United States Congressman Rush Holt, and Alan Rosenberg was sworn in as Deputy Mayor by Mayor Mironov. Reelected Council Members Hector Duke, Alan Rosenberg, and Perry Shapiro were sworn into office for new four-year terms. Township volunteers were also recognized for their many years of service on Township boards and commissions. At the meeting, Edward H. Herman was sworn-in as the new East Windsor Municipal Judge. Judge Herman is the municipal court judge in Plainsboro/Cranbury, Highland Park, Helmetta, Jamesburg, and Perth Amboy, and presiding judge of Middlesex County Municipal Courts.

Township Awarded \$199,000 Post Sandy Mitigation Grant Funds

Mayor Janice S. Mironov announced that East Windsor Township was approved to receive two grants totaling \$199,000 in Post Sandy Mitigation funds. The two grant awarded projects are \$96,000 for a permanent generator for the East Windsor Public Works facility and \$103,000 for a permanent generator for the East Windsor Senior Center. The two grant funding awards were provided by Mercer County Executive Brian Hughes. Mercer County had received a total of \$1,034,738 from the State of New Jersey Office of Mitigation, which could be allocated toward eligible projects as vetted under State criteria.

No Tax Increase 2014 East Windsor Municipal Budget

NO TAX INCREASE 2014 Township Budget was adopted by Mayor Janice S. Mironov and Council Members. The East Windsor municipal component remains at less than 15% of the total local property tax bill, and is among the lowest amounts in the entire **region** and well below the statewide average. In addition, the 2014 municipal tax levy amount is well below the available state cap levy amounts. The municipal component of the local property tax bill remains at the same 2013 rate of \$0.431 (**43.1 cents**) per \$100 of assessed valuation. This means that for the 2014 average residence assessment of \$258,987, the 2014 municipal tax is \$1116. The fiscally conservative budget document retains all existing services and contains no employee reductions or additions. The municipal budget is a result of the Township's commitment to continually seek out additional efficiencies, cooperative purchasing avenues and service sharing opportunities, while maintaining a very low debt level. The NO TAX INCREASE budget also is a result of the pro-active efforts of the Township to carefully plan and to closely monitor expenditures and revenues throughout the year.

East Windsor Exit 8 Transportation and Development Study

Preliminary findings and proposals were publicly presented by consultant Taylor Design Group on February 11. The Township planning initiative, funded by a \$100,000 grant from the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission Transportation and Community Development Initiative Program, was undertaken to review the impacts to circulation and development for the surrounding area of the relocated and expanded East Windsor Interchange 8 of the New Jersey Turnpike and Turnpike widening. The presentation provided an update on the study and an opportunity for residents to offer feedback and ask questions. ROADWAY IMPROVEMENTS

New Jersey Turnpike Widening Projects Updates



The NJ Turnpike Widening Project's resurfacing and striping of Route 33 is near completion. During May

and June, Old York Road, between Conover and Windsor-Perrineville Road, will be resurfaced. This resurfacing will take 5 to 7 days and residents should anticipate delays; however, the road will remain open. Monmouth Street, between Route 33 and the Hightstown border, and Etra Road, between Philyet Drive and the Hightstown border, will be resurfaced. Needed improvements and restoration work will be performed to Davison and Richardson Roads. The Turnpike Authority states the Project will be completed by fall 2014. Completed Roadway Projects

Mercer County finished roadway repairs and resurfacing of Old Trenton Road, between Princeton Hightstown Road and the East Windsor/Cranbury border bridge. East Windsor completed resurfacing of **Conover Road** from Woods Road to Route 130. The project was paid for by developer funds.

Hickory Corner Road

East Windsor has been awarded a \$250,000 NJ Department of Transportation grant to resurface Hickory Corner Road between Dorchester Drive and Dutch Neck Road. Construction will start in late summer/early fall.

Woodland Drive

Woodland Drive, between Oak Creek Road and Hankins Road, will be resurfaced. The contract is expected to be awarded in June with construction in mid-summer.

Millstone Road Bridge Closure

Construction began in December to replace the Millstone Road Bridge. The bridge will be totally closed to through traffic for approximately six months. A signed detour using Old Trenton Road, Southfield Road, Nostrand Drive and Cranbury Neck Road is being used during construction. Millstone Road/John White Road will be open to local traffic up to the bridge construction area.

East Windsor Urges Motorists to "Put the Phone Down"

The US National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates that 25% of all police-reported traffic accidents are caused by a variety of driving distractions including the use of hand-held cellular phones. The use of hand-held communication devices while driving has been prohibited in New Jersey since March 1, 2008.

The Township wants to remind all drivers that this law was enacted for the safety of all drivers and pedestrians and urges motorists to follow these basic tips.

Cell Phone Safety Tips:

- Turn your phone off or put the ringer on silent to avoid the urge to answer.
- Put your phone in a secure location that is easily accessible only in case of emergency.
- Never dial while driving; move to a safe area off of the roadway.
- Use a hands-free unit so both hands remain on the steering wheel at all times.
- Prior to driving, set up your voice-mail to take messages.
- Never text while driving. There is NO message more important than the value of human life.
